The resort actually consists of two interconnected mountains, each with significant and varied terrain, which virtually guaranteed no-line access to the lifts. It was somewhat lifts. The Cahilty Hotel, one of the original hotels to be constructed in the base area, provided direct access to the lifts. The base itself offers multiple amenities in a compact and attractive alpine village setting.



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L he Ski Trip Committee (Mark Grey, Gary&Elise Kloesz, Bob&Annie Bacon, Ann Baylor, Jim Blum, Scott Anthony, and Barb McCauley) has been hard at work putting together a great slate of trips for 2023/24: Killington, Sunday River, Stratton Mt. Tremblant, as well as Big White, BC, Canada have been firmed up.

Although Trip Leaders have done a solid job in putting together these trips, there are some changes to the usual pricing and logistical procedures. First. the process of purchasing/acquiring lift tickets. Many resorts are now requiring advance online purchase of lift tickets by Where noted on the flyers, skiers. participants on some of our trips (e.g., Killington, Sunday River) will need to purchase tickets on their own. Where needed, the flyers will specify the procedures to follow, and will indicate the applicability of passes, such as Ikon.

Second, all of our trips will utilize RSC's new operating system (*Wild Apricot*) for registering and paying for ski trips. However, some of the same procedures used in the past (writing a check to Rochester Ski Club and filling out a paper copy of registration) will still be available. Again, information for registering and paying will be included on the flyers for each trip. Please note that RSC membership is still a requirement for participation in all RSC ski trips.
